
Pet owners typically think of pet care as nutrition, veterinary care, toys, playtime, and of course unconditional love. All too often we forget about daily and professional maintenance of their skin and hair from their adorable face all the way to their happy tails. Unkempt pet hair, salt, and excessive moisture during the winter months can create unhealthy conditions leading to irritation and a possible need for veterinary intervention.

Unless you plan to keep your pet inside 100% of the time, winter brings a need for extra measures. Regardless of breed, paw care should be at the top of that list. Although they make booties, not all people or pets want to deal with the hassle. Salt and unnecessary moisture create a chemical reaction that can burn your pets paw pads. Long hair on feet and pads can also cause slippery situations. Keeping hair trimmed, clean, and shaving pads will help lesson these complications. Make sure to protect your fur baby's feet. If they are not wearing booties, then you should wipe off paw pads after each outside adventure. Salt naturally dries out their pads so be sure to add moisturize to all their pads with a pet safe balm.

The proper grooming routine will vary according to your pets' coat needs.

The cold weather outside and dry heat combo from your home during the winter months can dry out your pets' skin. Adding a conditioner will help bring moisture back to the hair to help keep it healthy. Pets with undercoat should have a de shed service to remove "dead" shedding hair. For long & curly coat haircuts, consider the temperature you maintain in your household. If you keep your home toasty, remember your pets cannot take off extra layers. You can always add a sweater or coat to keep them warm when enjoying winter weather.







Whatever hair length you choose, please be mindful pets with undercoat, long, and curly hair coats can mat very easily if not taken care of properly. Pay close attention to the areas that see a lot of friction: neck, behind ears, under chin/throat area, and under arms. If you choose a sweater or coat option it can compress hair and easily mat any area the sweater or coat comes in contact with their hair, if left on for extended periods of time.

What is matting? It is densely tangled clumps of hair. The loose hairs twist and embed into other hair. If the coat is not properly cared for it is easy for this to occur. When matting is left too long it can cause more damage to brush or comb mats out, ultimately leading to your groomer having no choice but to shave your pet's hair. This can leave pets with very short haircuts (usually not what the owner or groomer want to do). Matting can also cause numerous health conditions including itching, irritation, and skin infections. Removing heavy matting from a pet's coat includes risks of nicks, cuts, and abrasions due to warts, moles, and skin folds hidden in the mats and a consequence of the density of the matting. Heavy matting can trap in moisture near the pet's skin allowing fungus or bacteria to grow causing skin irritations that exist prior to grooming. The dematting process can

also cause patchiness and hair loss due to damaged skin and hair follicles. After dematting in any form on any part of the pet blood rushes back to the areas matting existed and can cause other issues like hematomas in the ear area. After grooming a densely matted pet, you should consider a follow up vet visit to help care for exposed or potential conditions.

In conclusion, grooming is absolutely essential for your pets overall health and the upfront regular care cost will save you from surprising unplanned veterinary cost. To prevent complications from improper grooming care and to keep your pet happy, healthy, and safe, you should schedule your pets' regular professional grooming services today. 

Pet Bird Cages and Environment



is imperative to stave off depression and anxiety in these birds. Moreover, be prepared for their vocal proclivities, as Budgies are known for their talkativeness and can create a cacophonous household. These petite parrots have a lifespan of 7-10 years or more, requiring a sustained financial commitment. However, the costs of keeping Budgies as pets are relatively affordable in comparison to some other avian species. Expenses include securing an appropriately sized cage, food, cage accessories, periodic veterinary visits, bedding, cleaning supplies, and appropriate lighting. The costs may fluctuate, but typically involve initial outlays for the cage, monthly food expenses, and occasional vet consultations. Additionally, provision must be made for initial cage accessories, cleaning supplies, and educational resources. Factor in long-term commitment and potential replacement costs for items in your budget.

Possible Disadvantages of Spiders as Pets
Despite their convenience and simplicity,
the following may need to be considered
before owning a spider:

- Nearly all spiders are poisonous to some degree. Before choosing a spider for a pet, you must consider that some spiders have more potent venom than others.
 There are some people who are allergic to spider venom (even very weak potency) just as some people would be allergic to a bee sting.
- Tarantulas have more than one mode of protection. In addition to mildly poisonous venom, they can flick their abdominal hairs if they feel threatened.
- Many spiders are natural escape artists and need a properly sealed environment in order to protect themselves and your home.
- Most spiders, even in ideal conditions, don't live very long. Tarantulas, may be the only exception to this rule; sometimes living over 20 years with proper care.





- Most spiders do not enjoy handling.
 Dropping a tarantula can cause its abdomen to burst, which usually results in death.
- Spiders do not react well to other household pets.
- Some states prohibit the purchase or possession of spiders.

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Selecting the Right Pet Spider for You

If you're in the beginning stages with a spider, it's best to select a species that's neither fragile nor harmful. The best beginner spider would be a tarantula such as the Chilean rose, Mexican Redleg, or Costa Rican Zebra. These species aren't terribly venomous and are pretty docile when compared with some other tarantulas (their venom is comparable to bee venom). Remember that if you have kids, many insect pets belong to the "look but don't touch" category, mainly because they may be too delicate for constant handling beyond their main caregiver.

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Things to Remember Before Buying a Pet Spider

Consult local, county and state government organizations with regards to legality. Not all locales allow the keeping of spiders, venomous or not, so it is a good idea to research this before making a purchase.

Find out about the treatment (housing, environment, diet) required for the pet you are considering. While many pet spiders are inexpensive to own, offering the suitable surroundings may be tricky for some species, especially for the greater exotic tarantulas. In most cases, you would like to simulate their natural environment as closely as possible. Find out what is required for food and take into account if you will be able to offer the proper diet.

Check the life expectancy of the species you have chosen. A lot of spiders have fairly short life-spans, but some tarantulas can live for 20-30 years (and females are considerably hardier than males).

Learn the proper method of handling your spider. While this is an obvious need for venomous animals, it is just as crucial for non-venomous arachnids as well. They can suffer critical or fatal wounds by incorrect handling.

Find out, from a reputable source, exactly which species are venomous; even a mildly venomous tarantula may cause a lot of pain. Also, tarantulas have special fine hairs on their abdomen, which they expel if threatened; these could be incredibly irritating and dangerous if they get in your eyes. If you're getting a tarantula, make sure you find out not only how best to avoid bites, but also how to deal with bites should they occur.



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THE ETHICS of Veterinary Medicine

Veterinarians constantly face ethically challenging situations in their jobs. They often have to make difficult moral judgments about how to treat an animal, and the stakes of their decisions may be life-or-death for their patients. Because of this, the European Union has required all veterinary schools' curricula to include ethics courses since 2005. However, it's uncertain whether having taken an ethics course causes veterinarians to engage in more thoughtful ethical reasoning about the dilemmas they face.

Researchers asked students at a veterinary school in Germany to answer a series of questions that tested their moral judgments. Of the 86 students who completed the questionnaire, 61 reported having previously taken an ethics course. They each wrote down their opinions in response to ethically challenging scenarios, such as a farmer who does not want a veterinarian to attend to his sick cows and a mother who refuses to pay for her daughter's guinea pig's lifesaving treatment.


The researchers could not identify any significant quantitative differences in judgments or viewpoints between the responses of students who had taken an ethics course and those who had not. Instead, they found that responses varied widely across both groups. Most students seemed to grapple with the conflict

between humans' economic interests and animals' welfare. In those cases. students often attempted to persuade the animal's guardian that it was in their financial interest to save the animal.

A qualitative analysis revealed some differences. When asked to identify the main "stakeholders" in each scenario, students often named the veterinarian and the human client as the major players with competing interests, rather than the animal whose life was in peril. Interestingly, in the scenario about the guinea pig, a larger percentage of students who had taken an ethics class (37%) chose to euthanize the animal than students who hadn't (15%).

Students who had taken an ethics class were also more likely to ask for additional information. They typically presented a wider range of both causes of and solutions to the problems at hand. This may suggest that the ethics courses taught students to identify more considerations involved in animal welfare dilemmas and to assess the competing interests in those dilemmas more critically.

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
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
